# IN BLOOM

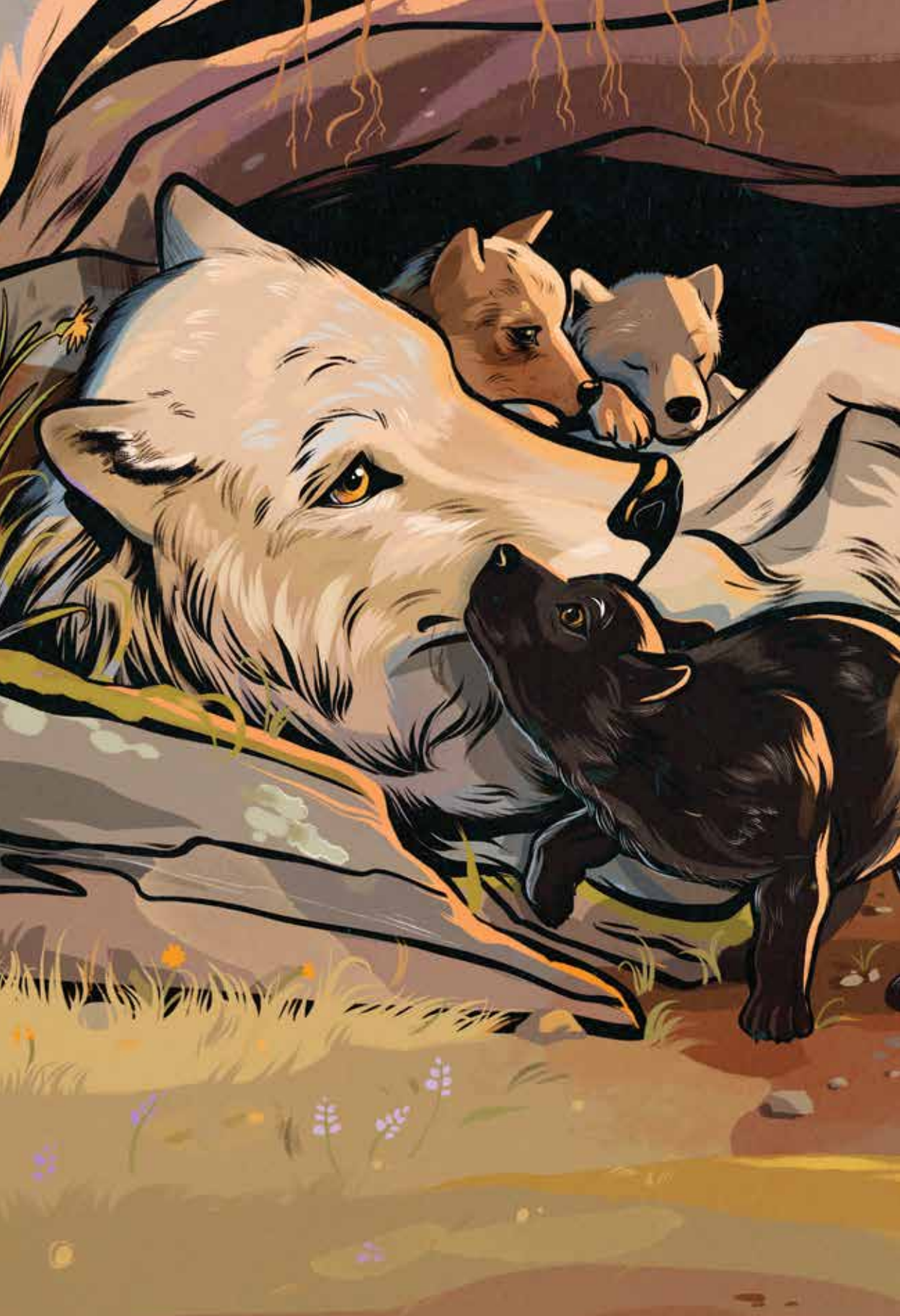
Lasa ‘Yan’tsa, the budding tree and blooming flower moon, is upon us. This lunar cycle<sup>1</sup> happens in May when spring takes hold of the land, and the plants begin preparing themselves for the summer to come. The air starts to change as the sun’s warmth moves the currents of spring, stirring up the scents of new blossoms. Lasa ‘Yan’tsa is a season of birth, and many species of animals are bringing new life into the world, including a pack of wolves who have six new pups<sup>2</sup> born only three short weeks ago.

The smallest of the pups is a charcoal black female, who has a tiny strip of white fur above her left eye. The black wolf already has a sense of smell 100 times better than any human, and even domesticated<sup>1</sup> dogs cannot compare to her ability. Right now, she only has a nose for mother's milk. Her ears grow larger every day, her eyesight gets sharper, and her legs stretch farther, and she is beginning to desire to explore beyond their cozy den among the pines.



When Lasa maa'y, the gathering and preparing berry moon, arrives, the little black wolf moves faster and now travels a little farther from the comfort of home. This time of year, there is more prey' for the wolves, including gax, the rabbit, which is a favourite of the pack. The small black pup now has a voracious appetite for meat and will aggressively push her way to the front when the adults return from a hunt. This aggressiveness will serve her well in the future.

# THE GITXSAN

The Gitxsan Nation are Indigenous peoples from their unceded territories of the Northwest Interior of British Columbia. This 35,000 square kilometres of land cradles the headwaters of Xsan or “the River of Mist,” also known by its colonial name, the Skeena River. The land defines who they are.

The Nation follows a matrilineal line, and all rights, privileges, names, and stories come from the mothers. The Lax Seel (Frog), Lax Gibuu (Wolf), Lax Skiik (Eagle), and Gisghaast (Fireweed) are the four clans of the people. It is taboo to marry a fellow clan member, even when there are no blood ties.

The four clans are divided among the territories by way of the Wilp system. A Wilp, or “house group,” is a group comprising one or more families. Each Wilp has a head chief and wing chiefs, who are guided by Elders and members of their Wilp. Currently, there are 62 house groups, and each governs their portion of the Gitxsan Territories.
